# FORWARD

### By Everett Sherron Continuous member of Troop 18/718 for over 55 years

To form a Boy Scout troop, at a minimum you have to have a scoutmaster, 5 boys, a 3 member committee and a sponsor. You update by re-registering every year. In the beginning, we didn't have much more than the minimum. The scoutmaster might have one assistant and the committee would meet if a Board of Review was needed. Generally, minutes were not kept. Finances were kept on the back of an old envelope. Gradually, we grew and there was more support and more people to help out.

Paper drives were the main fund raiser. In 1982, we started selling Christmas Greens and popcorn which we still do. Also, we became more organized. Most outdoor trips were to local camps and parks.

A number of our scouts did go to places like Philmont in New Mexico, a scout canoe base, a trip in the Rocky Mountains or to a National Jamboree but these trips were usually with a council contingent rather than being troop led.

With the closing of summer camp at Camp Hook after 1991 season, we branched out to different scout camps and new places including white water rafting and even to Summer Camp in North Carolina at Camp Bonner and the Pilmlico Sea Base in 2007.

From the start, and still happening, the troop normal activities would be a weekly troop meeting, a once a month weekend outing, a spring Camporee, a Fall Camporee, a week at a scout camp, and a Court of Honor twice a year. Skills are taught at the troop meetings and put into practice at the outdoor campouts and hikes. These activities are planned by the Patrol Leaders Council (PLC).

Order of the Arrow (OA) activities are separate and in addition to troop activities with the scouts' first duty being to his troop. A few scouts and leaders are voted every year into the OA by their fellow scouts. The OA is a group of honored scouts that do a lot of work at the district and council level with some physical work done at the council camp.

Early on, communication was mostly by word of mouth given at the troop or patrol meetings. Later the patrol leader was urged to keep in touch with his patrol at school or by telephone and urge them to attend all activities. By 1985, monthly calendars were planned and distributed so that scouts and families could plan ahead and be reminded of troop activities. Some of these calendars are included so that with a look you can see things that went on almost every day. Of course, the computer has changed all this and maybe since 2000 or so scouts and leaders keep in touch by e-mail. We have had our own computer for several years.

Membership is fluxional, but we gradually grew until our maximum was 46 youths and 35 adults in 2006. We have since dropped down and in 2011 we registered 21 youth and 26 adults. A lot of the rosters are available.

Assistant scoutmasters have hardly been mentioned but we have a large and devoted staff of assistants to help carry out the scout program. In 2011, we registered 13 assistant scoutmasters.

We also have an active committee that meets every month. It has sub committees that head up the different activities. The committee also holds boards of reviews for scout rank advancements.

Almost all of the history is shown by the tenure of the scoutmaster so that the sequence of events can be followed.

A grand banquet and booklet documenting the troop history were planned to celebrate our 75th Anniversary in scouting. In addition, a pocket patch, back patch and special edition T-shirts were produced.

### PROLOGUE

My father, Emmett S. Sherron came to Middletown February 1, 1927, as Boy Scout Executive of the Middletown Council. Troop 18 was chartered in 1927. It was sponsored by the Kiwanis Club and held meetings at Garfield elementary School, 1830 Yankee Road. The school was a brand

new school at the time and was demolished in 2006. The Scoutmaster for the troop was Alvin H. Ferguson. He was an engineer Pittsburgh from spending time in Middletown help-

ing to build Armco's East works. After 7 years, the troop charter lapsed in 1934 and 1935.

A note of interest: In 1922 when Lincoln School was being built on Central Avenue, they had surplus army barracks as temporary classrooms. When Lincoln School was finished, the rooms were moved to Garfield school which was under construction and opened in 1927. In the spring of 1927, the buildings were moved to Camp Hook and assembled for a mess hall in time for the 1927 summer camping season.

Circa 1928: Troop 18's booth at a merit badge show in the Civic Association building located where the United Way building is now. The original building was a YMCA with a swimming pool in the basement. The merit badge show was in the original gym. The Boy Scout office was in the rear of the same building.

They met at the church on Wilbraham road prior to Verity Parkway being built. The building still stands and is occupied by the Full Gospel Tabernacle, 2710 North Verity Parkway.

In 1937, the scoutmaster was C. E. Comer. The troop was still sponsored by the Avalon Cumberland Presbyterian Church. In March 1938, the sponsor was changed to the Maple Park School PTO with D. J. Kimble as scoutmaster. They met at the school at 3001 Illinois Avenue. The school was torn down about 2000 and houses were built on that site. In 1939 and 1940, Joe P. Haigh was scoutmaster. On February 17, 1939, the troop won the Old Trails Round-Up Achievement Award for attaining three stockades. They also won a standard rating in the "Troop Achievement Contest"

for the period of January 1 to July 31, 1939. Copies of the certificates are shown. They are both signed by Council President C. L. Kingsbury and Scout Executive Tom C Venable. During the year 1942, the scoutmaster was Carl W. Stork.

At the end of 1944, the sponsor was changed to the North Middletown Fire Department with Henry Gerhard as scoutmaster. Starting in 1945, they met at the firehouse at 3200 Manchester Road. William Tucker was scoutmaster in 1946. In 1951 and 1952, Corliss Whitesell was scoutmaster, in 1952, Joe

Caldwell was assistant scoutmaster and became scoutmaster starting April 30, 1953.

When Roselawn and Maple Park were annexed to Middletown, the North Middletown Fire Department died. The fire department sponsored the troop from 1945 to April 30, 1956, about





11 1/2 years. Even though the fire department charter did not expire until April 30, 1956, the meeting place had already been changed in January 1952, to Joe Caldwell's home at 3615 Manchester Road. This date is according to David Caldwell who joined the troop as an eleven year old scout in January 1952. They met in the basement and the yard. The scouts often went across the street to Armco Park to play games. This was long before University Blvd and Miami University were established.

# In 1955 The Civitan Club Begins Sponsor of The Troop

In September 1955, Everett Sherron and son John Sherron joined Troop 18. Everett was Assistant scoutmaster and John was a new 11 year old scout. Lee Dennis was already a member and remains a current member serving now as an assistant scoutmaster. His older brother Mickey was a member and in 1956 was the troops first Eagle Scout. (the records before 1956 on Eagle Scouts, if there were any, have since been lost). Dave Caldwell was the troop's second Eagle Scout. Everett Sherron is also a continuous member of the troop.

Dave Caldwell recalled recently that the two wooden logs that the troop still uses to hold candles at the Courts of Honor were cut by the troop in 1953 while camping at Camp Hook. (now Twin Creek MetroPark)

Joe Caldwell was an assistant scoutmaster for 1 year before becoming the scoutmaster. Joe served as scoutmaster and continued in that role until April 30, 1967, a total of 14 years. He continued as an assistant scoutmaster for Everett Sherron for 7 years from April 30, 1967, to January 1974, and followed with 10 additional years on the troop commit-

tee. This gave Joe a total of 32 years as a scout leader for Troop 18. He died on Palm Sunday April 15, 1984.

On May 1, 1956, the first Charter to the Civitan Club was issued. It showed Joe Caldwell was still the scoutmaster. Everett Sherron was the assistant. Dr. Richard Hasemeier was Institutional Representative (I.R.) and Elliot Perkins was the Committee Chair. His son, John, was in the troop.

Dr. Linden Meece was the IR for the next 4 years. Emmett Sherron, Everett Sherron and Harold Sherron were Civitan Club members and active in the troop. Their service club had about 25 members. Elliott Perkins was the Committee Chairman until 1980, making 14 years of service. The Civitan club continued as sponsor until January 26, 1989, when the sponsor officially became the First Baptist Church. The troop started holding meetings at the church in September 1983. The First Baptist Church has continued as the sponsor for the past 22 years.

## TROOP ACTIVITIES Starting September 1955 Civitan - Sponsor, Joe Caldwell - SM, & Everett Sherron - ASM

Meetings were held every Thursday night from 7:00 to 8:30 in Joe's basement and yard. Games were played across the street in Armco Park. That is where Lee Dennis who started scouting in 1954, broke his arm playing softball in 1958. The troop participated in Spring and Fall camporees. The Spring Camporees were put on by our Pokey Griffith District and the Fall camporees were put on by the Mound Builders' Area Council. In 1956, the council started a rotating 15 inch high trophy for the winner of the scout skills contests held at the camporees. In 1956, Troop 42 won. In 1957, Troop 18 won. In 1958, Troop 18 tied with Troop 29. In 1959, Troop 32 won; and in 1960, Troop 18 won and

The troop went to summer camp for one week at Camp Hook every summer. One summer Troop 18 scouts made up one quarter of the camp staff. Every month a hike or a weekend campout was held. We hiked the 14 mile Silver Moccasin Trail from Lebanon to Fort Ancient every two or three years. We hiked the

Lincoln Trail, and on November 11, 1961, we hiked the Freedom Trail both in Indiana. We hiked the Miami Erie Canal Trail from Middletown to Hamilton. One weekend we hiked three trails at Bear Hollow in Indiana. We also hiked the Anthony Wayne Trail from Hamilton to Eaton.

We ran sleds in the Klondike Derby every year from when it started up to present. The Klondike started in 1966 but patches were not given until 1967. It was usually held at Camp Hook. We sold fruit cakes for our sponsor and we had paper drives to make some additional money.

The most memorable campout was held May 17, 18, 19, 1957. It was at the Church of God Campground 5 miles east of Lebanon. In those days, we camped in pup tents and it rained and rained so much that there was mud everywhere. We had 24 scouts and 2 leaders with the scouts arranged in the Crow Patrol, the Flying Eagle Patrol and the Explorers. On Saturday, 17 of us hiked up to Fort Ancient. In the skills contest, we won the first prize which was a trail cook kit which we still use. A little later our sponsor, the Civitan Club, gave the troop a 12 x 14 dark green wall tent which we still have.

The 1960 Camporee was the 50th Anniversary of Scouting. It was held just off Trenton Franklin Road, between the road and the Great Miami river.

## **TROOP ACTIVITIES** May1967 to January 1980 **Everett Sherron, SM & Civitan Club Continuing Sponsor**

On May 1, 1967, Everett Sherron changed from Assistant Scoutmaster to Scoutmaster. In 1964 the troop meetings were changed to the basement of Everett's home at 2901 Oxford Avenue. Assistants were Joe Caldwell, Lee Dennis and Peter Trepanier. There were 15 scouts with 5 added during the first year. Meetings were changed to 1 hour from 7:00 to 8:00 on Thursday. We continued with monthly outings, spring and fall camporees, hikes and a week of summer camp at Camp Hook. One year there was a zip line across Lake George that Mike Osborne especially liked.

The troop attended 1976 Bicentennial Jamboree held at Wright Patterson Air Force Base in Fairborn. Everett Sherron, Lee Dennis and scout Steve Landis went to the 1977 National Jamboree at Moraine State Park, PA. It rained about 3 inches.

The scouts played steal the bacon in the front yard and built fires in the back yard. At that time you could burn trash in your back yard. We took industrial trips through places like Aeronca and Sorg Paper.

We built wooden camp boxes out on the driveway. We had paper drives and sold fruit cakes to make money. The Civitan Club gave us the 12 x 14 dark green wall tent. We had hikes from my house over to the Great Miami River and hiked along the bank and also in the river. One scout had to be rescued with both "throw a rope" which he didn't grab and then a successful "Go Rescue". We changed our meeting place from Everett Sherron's home to Wildwood school in 1979 and met there until 1983. Citivan was still the sponsor. On January 31, 1980, Everett Sherron changed from SM to ASM, Elliot Perkins continues as committee chairman and the Civitan as sponsor. Everett was SM for 13 years. Lee Dennis became SM on February 1, 1980.

## Lee Dennis Scoutmaster February 1980 to January 1991 **Civitan Club Continued Sponsor until 1989**

Steve Landis was scoutmaster for only a few months after the start of Lee's tenure. Lee joined the troop in September 1954, and became an Eagle Scout in 1961. After teaching high school history



in Versailles, Ohio, Lee came back to Middletown to take over his Father's insurance business after his father retired. He rejoined the troop in 1972 as ASM. Lee became scoutmaster on February 1, 1980. Everett Sherron and J.D. Bartlett were ASM. In 1979, we had started to meet at the Wildwood school where we used the gym for meet-

ings. We participated in the 1980 Olympirama Camporee held at the Wright Patterson Air Force Base in Fairborn. We camped between the runways. In June 1984, the Cit-O-Rama Camporee was held at WPAFB. Lee was the Mound Builders' Area Council's Chief.

The troop was enjoying a week of summer camp at Camp Hook when there was a chemical spill on the railroad track in Carlisle and on July 9,

1986, the whole camp was evacuated by school buses to Camp Freidlander.

All summer camps were at Camp Hook.

We started selling Christmas Greens in October 1982, for early December delivery. They came by truck to Lee's office on Tytus Avenue. The 22" wreath sold for \$8.50. We are still selling greens. In 2010, the 22" wreath sold for \$20. In 2010, we sold \$6715 (a record) and made \$2507.75 for the troop. The greens sale is our largest money maker. In September 1983, we started meeting at the First Baptist Church with the Civitan Club remaining as the sponsor until January 1989, when the First Baptist Church became our sponsor. (see letter from Civitan relinguishing their 33 year sponsorship on next page)

The adult leaders continuing as registered leaders for the coming 1989 year were Lee Dennis SM, J.D. Bartlett and Mark Seiple as ASM. Everett Sherron who started as committee chairman Feb 1, 1983. Dave Curliss



held the role of scouting coordinator.

In February, 1989, the troop bought and installed two 25 foot aluminum flag poles in concrete in front of the First Baptist church. Lee Dennis served Troop 18 as a scoutmaster for 11 years.

## Andrew Golembiewski (Mr.G), SM Feb, 1, 1991 to Jan 31, 1994 First Baptist Church continuing sponsor and meeting place

Andy has an extensive Boy Scout background. He was an Eagle Scout in 1965, a Cub Scout leader and was an assistant scoutmaster 1973-1974 and again in 1987-1990 for Troop 20. He took Woodbadge in 1989. He was an assistant scoutmaster for Troop 718 for 1990 and became scoutmaster February 1, 1991, and served for three years until January 31, 1994. He has taken several training courses, taught some of them and been on district and council committees. He has the Scouters Training Award (1989) and the Scouters Key (1994). He became an OA Vigil member in 1994. He received the District Award of Merit in 1991. He was on the Brownsea staff in 1993. He was awarded the Bronze Pelican Religious award in 1992. It is the only one in our troop. He was Governor of the Klondike Derby in 1992 and 1993. After serving three years as scoutmaster Andy is still serving the troop as an assistant scoutmaster.

The committee built three cabinets in the church garage on May 25, 1991, for storage. A special thanks to Bob Welch for planning the project and to Mike Lane for bringing his table saw. The project turned out very well. The Cubs painted them; these cabinets are still in use today.

As a shakedown for the 1991 Philmont Trek, the Crew went backpacking

to the Red River Gorge. The troop and Everett came along. During our hike at the top of the cliff line we got a little lost. We took a compass bearing and followed that until we reach the edge of a cliff we could not get around. Luckily, Bill Hines had rappeling gear in his pack and everyone, including Everett and a leader holding his German Shepard in his arms, rappeled down the cliff and made it back to the cave we were camped in before it turned dark.

Andy was the crew advisor for a trip to Philmont Scout Ranch in New Mexico from June 22 to July 7, 1991. Scouts were Jeff Flory Crew Leader, Steve Golembiewski, Aaron Seiple, Geoffrey Lane, T.J Fisher and James Wear from Troop 1. The other adult was Bob Stein from Troop 1.

From July 7 to 13, 1991, Andy led the last summer camp at Camp Hook before the camp closed. The next year 1992, and again in 1993 he led a move to Chief Logan Scout camp near Chillicothe. We went to Peterloon October 25-27, 1991. It is held every other year and we usually attend.

Again we had hikes or campouts every month and a week at summer camp. We continued selling Christmas greens and popcorn sales as our fundraisers. We continue these things to date.

Ten scouts and two leaders backpacked a portion of the Appalachian Trail in the Smokey Mountains on April 14-17, 1993. (See picture below) Another high adventure was the white water rafting trip on the New River June 11-13, 1993. Andy, Bill Hines, Mike Lane and John Fisher

and fall camporees the troop also took monthly outings to nearby scout camps and parks. Andy started more adventurous trips to places like Hocking Hills, father and son canoe trips on the Mad and Miami rivers, Red River Gorge, cave trips, ski trips, Smokey Mountains, kayaking and Lake Erie. We still do most of these things from time to time depending on the Junior Leader council planning. Andy retired as scoutmaster on January 31, 1994, and became an assistant scoutmaster, a position he still holds. The troop gave him a plaque at the August 16, 1994, Troop Court of Honor held at the Bob Wise farm.

### Ken Yarber Scoutmaster February1, 1994 to August 10, 1998 FBC sponsor and meeting location

Ken Yarber joined the troop on 2-1-93 as an assistant scoutmaster and became scoutmaster on 2-1-94. He was formally installed at the Court of Honor 8-16-94 at Wise Farm. The troop has two National Merit Award winners; Stacy and William Britton. The brothers made sure there was no one in a burning home across the street from their home in 1994.

The troop was active in the spring and summer of 1994. Commando campout at Camp Hook was April 22, 23, 24, 1994. The Family Jamboree planned for May 20, 1994 at Coney Island had to be cancelled due to high water. The troop was able to journey to South Bass Island in Lake Erie on June 3, 4, and 5. The summer camp was July 10-16 at Chief Logan for the third year. (See the group picture) On July 12 all 17 scouts left the camp to see the outdoor live drama Tecumseh.

The Family Jamboree was May 18 and 19, 2001, at Coney Island. On Saturday, the troop helped in the canoe area. Scouts were Matt Huss, Nick Magill, Chris Redding, Oscar Vasquez, Phillip Voyles and Bobby Withrow.

> All arrived at Ft. Macon SP beach Saturday to body surf and boogie board. The crew cooked hotdogs

Sunday the Crew visited Washington, NC. On the first day at the sea base, we met our guide, Taylor, and we practiced our wet exit and re-entry. Any rest or drink of water cost us as the waves and wind drove us backwards. We finally made it back to Shell Point where Dr. Nenni was waiting for us. The Crew went to Beaufort to see the Maritime Museum and wait out the storm while Mr. Neal and Mr. Hines went to camp to get the keys for our next campsite. While the adults were on the car ferry the storm hit with winds and waves so heavy the ferry couldn't dock till the storm let up. With all the lightening the Crew was very glad they weren't on the water in a smaller boat. At our next campsite we found showers, AC and TV. We cooked our favorite dinner of beef stew (Mr. Frwin loves beef stew) and rice. The next morning we had a little more trouble the usual getting everyone up and had to drag Aaron down a couple flights of stairs. We launched into the sound and paddled to an amphibious assault ship that was in for repairs. On the way back we saw a porpoise that was slowly cruising past us. After lunch we went to Taylor Creek in Beaufort and went into the middle of Carrot Island where we saw wild horses, found oysters and tried fishing again. For dinner that night we went to the dinner that served all-you-can-eat shrimp. We were joined by Josh's mother and his cousin. The next morning we headed back to sea base.

Dr. Nenni took some of the Crew out on Sailfish sailboats and taught them how to sail. It was quite a sight watching them solo sail back and forth in front of seabase. While unwinding on the porch we watched a pod of dolphins feeding out by the dock A perfect end to a perfect trip.

By mid 2000 a lot of correspondence, calendars, reports and records were moved to computer and hard copies are not provided.

Stan Clinard stepped down as scoutmaster, at the end of 2008. He still serves as an assistant scoutmaster.

### **Dr. John Nenni** – **Scoutmaster** January 1, 2009 and continuing on

John Nenni joined Troop 718 as a new scout in August 1990. John progressed through the advancement trail earning his Eagle Rank in September 1994. He went to St Xavier High School and was a member of their swim team. He attended Ohio State University for eight years earning his degree in veterinary medicine. He maintains a practice in the local communities serving the large animal population. John rejoined Troop 718 as an adult in early 2007 as one of the assistant scoutmasters. He became the scoutmaster in January 2009.

The troop has tried to continue its scouting traditions, with a plethora of Eagle Scouts, meetings once weekly, and camping once a month. Trips include weekend campouts at Caesar's Creek State Park, South Bass Island State Park, Fort Loramie State Park, Camp Birch, Friedlander, Michaels, and many others. In recent years the troop has pushed away from the backpacking interests, and on towards kayaking. For many summer campouts the troop includes the one-manned vessels and explores waterways, both lakes and streams.

Red River Gorge is a common destination, and has been on the calendar at least once a year for the last several. Though snakes may keep us away for the summer months, early Spring and late Fall are ripe opportunities to explore the wilderness. A yearly bike trip on the Little Miami trail is also on the calendar.

Currently the roster stands at 21 youth, and 31 adults. At most meetings the troop retains around ½ of the youth members, but 75% of the total are active in the campouts. Most progress up the ranks and several are currently working on their last rank advancement: Eagle Scout.

The troop's summer camp options are always changing. After the summer of 2007 when the troop traveled all the way to North Carolina to Camp Bonner, we haven't gone to 2 camps in a row: 2008 Chief Logan, 2009 Friedlander, 2010 Ransburg, 2011 Friedlander. For the summer of 2012, the troop will be heading to Camp Crooked Creek near Louisville, Kentucky. Every summer camp offers something different, keeping older boys interested, and giving the younger ones greater opportunities.

2009 also played host to a high adventure trip for the Venture Crew: they spent a week sailing on Lake Erie, living aboard a sailboat. This was even an international trip for the troop, since one of the islands visited was Pelee Island, the southernmost point of Canada. The troop spent 2 nights there, even surviving a storm with 70 knot winds.

In 2010, many members of the troop traveled to Fort A.P. Hill in Virginia for the 100th anniversary of the Boy Scouts of America. That one will be the last National Jamboree held at A.P. Hill, as the BSA has acquired land in West Virginia, which will become a new high adventure base.

The troop will continue to pursue developing character and skills via different outdoor experiences. For the coming decades, it seems likely the troop will still meet on Tuesday nights, and go camping once monthly. With any luck, the next 25 years will pass, and many more Eagle Scouts will move on to the community, as experienced leaders. Some will return as Scoutmasters, continuing the long line of Scouts.

# **Camp Hook Gate**

Troop 18 has had a long association with the entrance gate at old Camp Hook. The original thunderbird gate was erected in 1948. By 1962, the gate needed to be replaced due to weather damage. The Order of the Arrow, Nachenum Lodge 145, agreed to fund the replacement cost for the new gate. Everett Sherron helped with the placing of the two telephone poles that supported the gate. Michael Dennis designed the Indian artwork and the thunderbird head. Michael and Lee Dennis painted the gate. Everett built the Beech stockade located on each side assisted by his son Douglas and Lee Dennis.

By 1982, the gate needed to be replaced again due to wear and tear, Nachenum Lodge 145 again agreed to take on the project. The original artwork from 1962 had been painted over several years before, it was decided to bring back the Indian artwork from 1962. Five OA members completed this work. Their initials are added within the breechcloth design located at the top of the gate. Three of the OA members from Troop 18: Lee Dennis, J.D. Bartlett and Steve Landis, spent over 40 hours drawing, taping and painting of the design. J.D. sketched and painted the shields located at the top of the two support poles. After the gate was rebuilt, it was hung on the original 1962 telephone poles. A few years later Lee repainted the signage above the gate and refurbished the head by sanding and repainting.



Camp Hook was sold to Five Rivers Metro Parks in 1997. In June 1999, Lee wrote to the park system inquiring about the gate and was told it would be destroyed within the next year. Lee asked if he could have the head and two shields, the reply was he could have the entire gate! Arrangements were made to have the thunderbird body taken to Camp Friedlander with hopes it would be reused. Unfortunately, the gate was damaged a few years later and destroyed. The only parts of the gate remaining are the thunderbird head from 1962 and the to-tems from 1982.

THUNDERBIRD GATE Camp Hook Mound Builders Area Council Boy Scouts of America

August 1962

The entrance gate has just been rebuilt by the Nachenum Lodge, Order of the Arrow. It is 62 feet across and the main gate is 12 feet wide having a 14 foot clearance. The stockade part is made of Beech slabs. The main date is hung on utility poles set in 6 feet of concrete.



The shield emblems are the authentic Indian designs. The turtle design on the shield on the right hand pole is from the Order of the Arrow Mother Lodge in Philadelphia. The raccoon design on the shield on the left hand pole is the emblem of the Nachenum Lodge.

The main gate is in the form of a Thunderbird. The design was chosen because of the religious significance to the American Indian. Patterns, symbols, and colors came to the Indians as dreams and hence, were believed to have magic powers or to be "good Medicine" for that particular Indian.

The head is a medicine man head used to drive away evil spirits. Originally, the head was made of colored patches of leather and worn by the medicine man. The sun on the head is the symbol of the origin of all life. The circle around the sun is the circle

of life and it is broken for the entering of life and for the leaving of life. You leave life by the same entrance as you entered life. The head is not designed to tell a story.

The rainbow is from the Navaho Indians. The small figures underneath the head, and the red, white and blue lines around the outside, are symbols of the Rainbow Goddess to protect everything. She was the goddess of all nature.

The crossed tomahawks are emblems used by our Mound Builders Area council

The paint used was donated by the Porter Paint Company. The design and the painting was done by Michael Dennis.

#### Boy Scout Troop #18 Memories 1951 – 1953

Troop 18 was chartered by "The North Middletown Fire Association" while I was a youth member of the Troop.

The Scoutmaster in 1951 & 1952 was Corliss Whitesell. Joe Caldwell became the Scoutmaster in 1953. Although we were sponsored by the Fire Association I remember that we had our weekly meetings at Maple Park School and/or Joe Caldwell's basement and yard.

Mr. Caldwell lived on Manchester Road across the street from "old" Armco Park. That made it quite easy for troop members to visit the park when it was open (and when it wasn't open too.) I spent many a night camping in the park and in particular the woods around the "Bunny Hollow" area. (Area is now Miami University Middletown (MUM))

Some of the scouts in the troop when I was a boy were: Bob and Dave Caldwell, Vic and Kenny Fraley, Ernie, Charles, and David Whitesell, Micky Dennis, Ralph Kemp, Billy Vaughn, Tommy Bell, Jesse Miller, and others I can't remember. Our troop wasn't organized very well in the early days and we Scouts did a lot of camping on our own. In the summer months when school was out we could camp out for a few days at a time almost weekly. (With parental permission of course) We would ride our bikes up to the park, hide them in bushes outside the gate, back pack into the park, and stay a couple of days/nights. I remember doing a lot of "lashing" on our campouts. Specifically I remember a bridge we built across a deep gully to allow us easier backpacking further into the woods to our camping area hideaway. Another thing I remember is cooking. On most of our overnights we usually had a can or two of pork and beans, hot dogs, bologna, and bread. We kept our milk, juice, and pop in a cool stream that ran by our area. (We didn't have coolers) Of course we all had canteens for water. (One thing I vividly remember was Jesse Miller cooking a pork chop on a flat rock in the fire. That really impressed me. Of course then I cooked mine the same way. It was delicious!)

Things were different back in those days. I can't remember a time when we caused problems for anyone. When we headed for home our bikes would be right where we left them. No vandalism at all. It was a great time to be growing up.

Our Troop participated in most holiday parades (July 4<sup>th</sup>, Labor Day, Memorial Day). It was expected and most local troops marched as well. These were great Scout turnouts.

I also remember going to Camp Hook for Summer Camp. I remember taking my "swim test" (no problem due to most of the guys in the troop belonged to the YMCA and knew how to swim) and staying in a cabin each night. As I recall these cabins would sleep about 8 guys and were located behind the dining hall and up the trail toward the Oak Mound Camp Site. I later learned these cabins were razed in the mid fifties.

These are a few of my memories of my Scouting as a youth. Some are a little fuzzy but I do remember it was a great time to be growing up. I still fondly recall sharing communality, fun, and fellowship with the Troop 18 Scouts of sixty years ago.
